Side extensions

Nurse control unit

Nurse control unit conveniently situated at the foot end of the bed can be used to lock all functions.



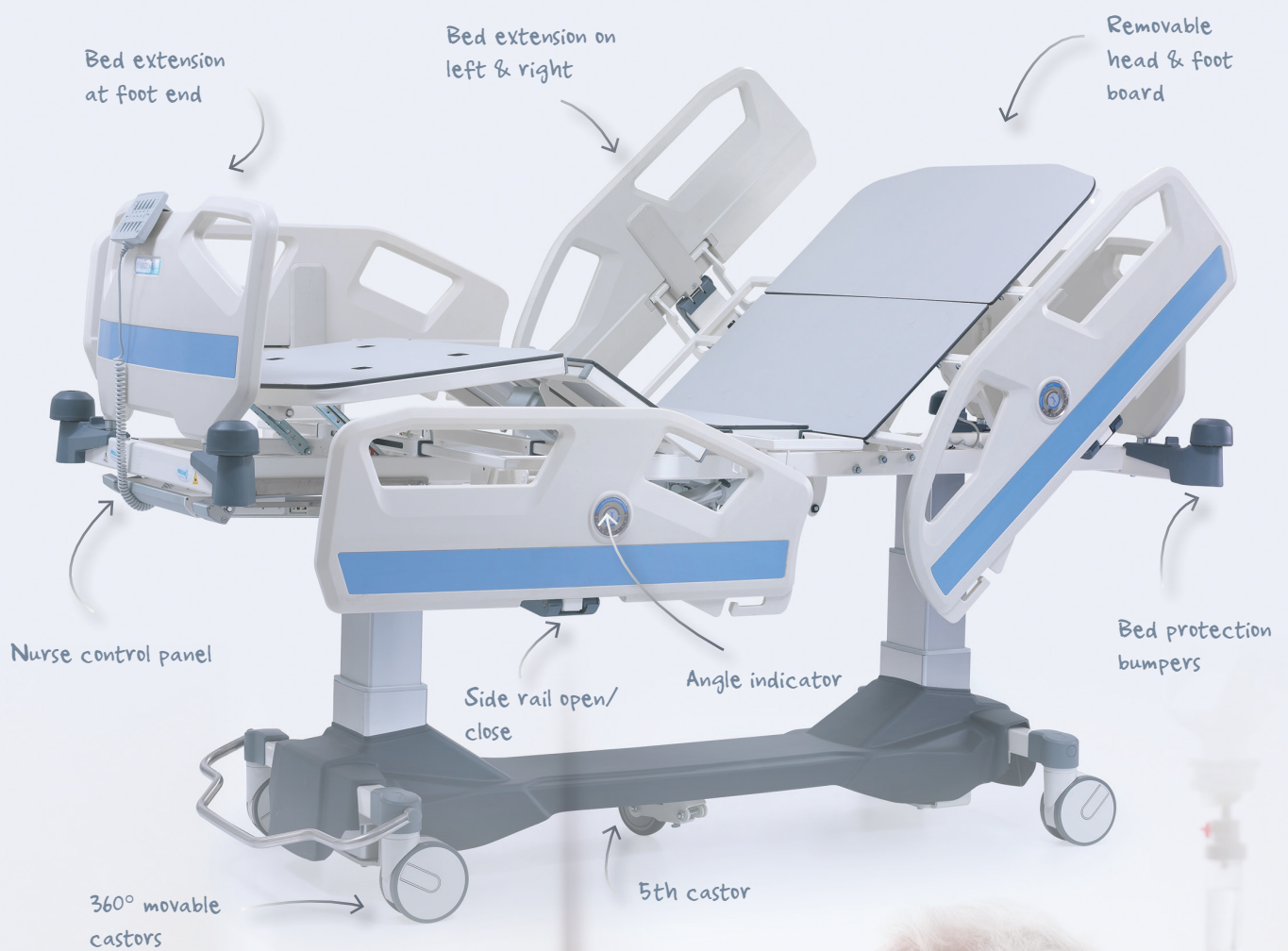
Bed extension
